Summary

Pippa is passionate about teaching both undergraduates and post graduates students to ensure that welfare and the behavioural needs of the animals they treat are considered on a daily basis.

Owner expectation and reliance on the family pet continues to increase, placing increased pressure on these companions. Pippa strives to reinstate and improve the human-animal bond between a client and their companion animal, through manageable behaviour modification programmes.

Behaviour treatment programmes should become part of the management protocol of chronic clinical cases and in-patient care; indeed it should be used in every aspect of animal interaction within the veterinary practice.

Pippa Hutchison qualified from the School of Psychology at the University of Southampton with a Master of Science (MSc) degree in Companion Animal Behaviour Counselling. She also holds a post-graduate diploma in Companion Animal Behaviour Counselling Dip (AS) CABAC.
